Spirited conductor of the Queens Philharmonic and the Denver Chamber Orchestra, transformed both ensembles from amateur groups into professional symphonies. At just five feet four inches, broke into conducting by asserting a thrilling forcefulness. "I decided to become a conductor be-cause I fell in love with the orchestra. I used to go to a lot of concerts, and I fell in love with the idea of musicians working together and creating, re-creating, something beautiful. That seemed to me like almost a utopia, that people could merge and create something magnificent. When I was twelve I thought that that had to be the most beautiful thing one could work in, and I decided then. I never had any doubts."
